# Search For Value Outline

#### The Teacher of Life

- 1. The *Greater* Teacher: the preacher & author of Ecclesiastes.
  - a. Called Koheleth, a Hebrew term usually translated "preacher" (1:1-2,12; 7:27; 12:8-10). The Greek word for "one who calls an assembly" is Ecclesiastes. The *Septuagint* gave this title to the book.
  - b. Who is the preacher?
    - "A son of David," "A king in Jerusalem," (1:1) "A king over Israel and Jerusalem," (1: 1,12)
    - "A builder of great projects" (2:4-6)
    - "One who owns many slaves, sheep, and cattle" (2:7)
    - "A wealthy man," "One with many wives or a large harem" (2:8)
    - "One who was wise and increased in wisdom beyond all before him,"
    - "A writer of many proverbs (12:9)
    - No one like Solomon (Prov.1:1-7; Chron.1:11-12)
- 2. The *Greatest* Teacher: The Word.
  - a. Solomon acknowledged his wisdom came from one greater than himself.
  - b. The greatest teacher (Matt.12:42; Luke 11:31; 1Cor.1:30).

# The Teaching on Life for Replacing Vanity with Value: 4 Themes

# 1. Routines must be surrendered to God's direction and control (1:2, 14; 12:8).

- a. Ecclesiastes begins and ends with the announcement that everything in life is vanity (1:2; 12:8). The term "vanity" is used more than 30 times in Ecclesiastes used metaphorically to mean "meaninglessness."
- b. Nothing we do or find gives us any ground for security, satisfaction, or hope. In this sense, life is vain.
- c. Illustration of Sir Leonard Wolfe and ping-pong.
- d. God's solution: Eccl.3:1-9; 1 Cor. 15:58; Matt. 6:19-20.

# 2. <u>True education begins and ends with God (1:13, 16-18; 2:12).</u>

- a. The preacher undercuts the naive importance we place on our own brains.
- b. We exalt those who "know the system," yet wisdom without God is vanity. Education without God cannot be of high value.
- c. God's answer: 1 Cor.13:2; Prov.1:7; 1 Cor.2:6-10.

# 3. Human experience is inadequate without God's revelation (11:3-5).

- a. Human observation is limited.
- b. Divine revelation is a necessity.
- c. God's answer: 2 Tim.3:16-17.

# 4. <u>Redeeming value is only possible with God in the picture (12:13-14).</u>

- a. Vanity ceases through a proper relationship with God.
- b. Romans 8:19-23.
- c. Life must include a search on how to become sons of God (John 1:12).
