<u>The Pain of Being Forsaken (v.1-21)</u>
"True believers may have the assurance of their salvation divers ways shaken, diminished, and intermitted; ... by God's withdrawing the light of his countenance, and suffering even such as fear him to walk in darkness and to have no light: yet are they never utterly destitute of that seat of God, and life of faith, that love of Christ and the brethren, that sincerity of heart, and conscience of duty, out of which, by the operation of the Spirit, this assurance may, in due time, be revived; and by the which, in the meantime, they are supported from utter despair" (W.C.F., XVIII; IV).

 - c. verses 11-18: stripped bare before the world.
- 2. God faithful to Us.
