Introduction

- 1. Paul's second pastoral epistle Paul to Timothy (1:1-2) last letter before being called home to heaven.
- 2. Paul writes 2Timothy as a prisoner in Rome and expects to soon die (2 Tim.1:17; 4:6).
- 3. Timothy became the spiritual child of Paul (1 Cor.4:17; 1 Tim.1:2; 2 Tim.1:2) and as left in Ephesus to complete the work there (1 Tim.1:3).
- 4. Jannes and Jambres (3:8) were thought to be magicians who opposed Moses (Exod.7:11-12).
- 5. When Paul was arrested and treated as a criminal (2:9). His arrest had been so sudden and unexpected he didn't have time to get his books or warm cloak (4:13).
- 6. Last Letter: The last time Paul was confined in Rome he had a lot of freedom and friends. This time he was cold, alone and expected to die (4:6-18). He mentions 23 individuals in this letter. As a dying man he was living for others.

- 3. On two occasions Paul addressed Timothy's gift (1 Tim.4:14 & 2 Tim.1:6). Why does Paul use last words to talk about spiritual gifts (1 Cor.12:4-31; Rom.12:3-13; Eph.4:11-16; 1 Pet.4:10-11)?

4.	Why is 2:3 necessary? What other analogies does Paul use to encourage Timothy to stay the course God had called him to?
5.	How does one get repentance (2:24-26)?
6.	Difficult times (3:1-5) and solutions (3:16, 17).
7.	Why do we need preaching so much (4:1-5)?
8.	Paul gives us an example of ending life well (4:6-8).
9.	Reminders for a difficult life: 2:19 and 4:17. No other religion anywhere has this.
