## PERSISTENT PHILADELPHIA

Rev. 3:7-13 David Rountree

- 1. The church at Philadelphia is like the church at Smyrna in that it receives no rebuke nor call to repentance.
- 2. Christians troubled by the Jews (v.9). The Jews tried to exclude these Christians from heaven and God (Matt. 23:13; 1 Thess. 2:15, 16), but Jesus sets before them an open door (v.8).
- 3. The church is addressed by Jesus who is holy and true (v.7) a description not found in chapter one but is common elsewhere (15:4; 19:11; 6:10).

## THE PERSONALITY OF GOD (v. 7)

- 1. God's sinlessness. Why this sinless description?
- **2. God's surety.** Why this description?
- 3. God's sovereignty. He has "they key of David." Why the "keys" description?

## THE PROMISE OF GOD (v. 12)

- 1. The Promise of Power (v. 8). Compare with the parable of Christ found in Matthew 25:14-30.
- 2. The Promise of Position (v. 12). What does it mean to be made a pillar in the temple of God?

## THE PROTECTION OF GOD (v. 9-12)

- 1. God will humiliate our Enemies (v. 9).
  - a. Deceiving Jews are those who reject and persecute those who are truly believers of Christ (John 8:39-41; 44; Rev. 12:7-10; 2 Cor. 11:14-15).
  - b. We do not have to worry with revenge, God will take care of this (Rom. 12:19-21).
- 2. God will keep us through the testing hour (v. 10).
  - a. We don't need to focus on danger but rather on the sufficiency of Christ to protect us from all evil (v. 10).
  - b. *Futurists* assume, "kept from the hour of testing" (3:10) means that believers will be raptured out of this world prior to tribulation. Yet Christians can be protected without leaving the planet (John 17:6, 15).
  - c. The *Idealists* sees merely a reference to the time temptation is greatest in our lives (Matt. 26:45; 38-46).
  - d. *Preterists* would argue that the phrase "whole world" is similar to Luke 2:1 referring to all the Roman world which would have been normal language in John's day.
  - e. *Historicists and some futurists* say that since Philadelphia had an "open door" that they represent the great evangelism period of the Great Awakening (1793 until Christ returns).
- 3. God will encourage our grip on faithful endurance (v. 11).
- 4. God will give us a new and better name (v. 12b).
